Our main mission is to work with marginalized communities of citizens in an unconventional creative form using the means of theatre, performing arts, dance or singing.

DBD (Theatre With No Home; herein after also referred to as DBD) provides a platform for presenting social topics that are being overlooked in the commercial artistic sphere. We combine the artistic with the social in order to help tear down stereotypes that marginalized communities face in the society.

DBD was informally founded in 2005 in the course of work on theatrical projects with people without a home and it became registered with the Ministry of Interior of the Slovak Republic on 12.5.2006 under the registration number VVS/1-900/90-28231. Members of the organization are people, who in the long run, engage in social, pedagogic or artistic practice, economy, management, and advertising.

We are based in Bratislava. Currently, we have nine members, several volunteers and many supporters.

Our community of actors and actresses is made up of people without homes, physically disabled, people from socially underprivileged communities, social workers, theatre artists and anyone who is interested in our theatre. Our actors and actresses receive financial compensation for performing in our theatre plays.

Labor A

The main objective of the project: In 2013, LaborA project was our major arts-drama project with ambition to become ergotherapy, i.e. therapy by work for our actresses, actors (homeless, disabled people) and for our DBD cast.

It consisted of two parts.

Part "Labor" was long-term dramatherapeutical workshop.

Part Labor

Part "Labor" was eight-month arts-work process which led to, among other things, a new theatre performance named Bábka (The Puppet) and working opportunity for homeless people.

Part A

Presentations (theatrical plays) in Bratislava.

Objectives of the project:

- Create a unique long-term dramatherapeutical workshop for DBD.
- Create a new theatrical performance.
- Present DBD performances in Bratislava.
- Access the issues of homelessness and life of excluded groups to the general public in attractive, positive form.

Project duration: October 2013 to September 2013.





The most important activities of the project:

- Assembling the "LaborA" team, finding stuff for all positions, creating the necessary documents – contracts and set the rules in the group with respect to specific needs of the group members.
- Dramatherapeutical workshop "Labor" in total duration of 96 minutes for the targeted group of actors and actresses of DBD.
- Playing at least 8 theatrical performances in Bratislava for free.
- PR activities.

The result of the project:

- Actors and actresses of DBD worked more than 1700 working hours in total throughout the project; we have also revitalized left wing of Piszotry Palace and create a theatre space there (500 working hours in total)
- There was a 186-hours dramatherapeutical workshop lasting 8 months.
- We have created brand new theatre performance Bábka (The Puppet).
- Regularly once a month we played some theatrical performance (Kuca Paca, Zázračné dieťa (The Prodigy) in Bratislava, 8 performances in total.
- The project involved 13 homeless and 4 disabled people; approved by Slovak authorities as severe disability with abbreviation ZŤP; (actors and actresses).
- We have organized a discussion with pupils at the Základná škola pre nadané deti (Elementary school for gifted children) on Skalická Street in Bratislava.
- Two documentary films were created during the project about our work. They were screened in RTVS (Slovak television and radio broadcasting corporation, in TV program series Colnica alebo Československo po 20 rokoch (Customs or Czechoslovakia after 20 years) and in program Cesta (The Path).

BÁBKA

The main objective of the project: rehearse, premiere and reprise a theatre play in which homeless and disabled people play together with puppet in human life size.


Project duration: January to June 2013

The most important activities of the project:

- Dramatherapeutical rehearsals.
- Creative meetings with the music composers, stage and costume designers.
- Motion exercises in space.
- Puppet creation.
- Artwork with puppet.
- PR activities.
- Posters and bulletin production and printing.
- General rehearsal and premiere.

The results of the project:

- We have created non-verbal, 30 minutes long play. Our actors were thought to work with puppet that they called Franky. Franky became a sort of mirror in which they projected their desires, fears, emotions. The strongest theme that repeatedly emerges when working with puppet was solitude. Solitude (Ioneliness) is underestimated problem that homeless people have to struggle with life on the street. However social isolation, lack of family and close relationship could prove to be fatal. Puppet helped to show the different forms of solitude that socially excluded people are actually dealing with.
- Dramatherapeutical rehearsals have engaged the homeless and the disabled people to artistic creation, they teach puppet techniques and practices.









The results of the project:

- Fee for rehearsal and plays could help actors to improve their financial situation; some of them were able to pay for the accommodation and food.
- Bábka (The Puppet) play opened new opportunities for performing on the foreign language festivals.
- DBD received an invitation to international festival in Berlin in June 2014 with Bábka (The Puppet) play.

Premiere took place on October 23, 2013 in Pisztory Palace.

Bábka (The Puppet) was also performed on November 30, 2013 at the International festival of homeless and disabled theatre ERROR 2013 and reprised on December 11, 2013 in Pisztory Palace in Bratislava.

>KRASOJAZDKYĎA The Equestrienne

The main objective of the project: to involve people from disadvantaged population groups on the occasion of release of original Slovak prose written by Uršuľa Kovalyk – Krasojazdkyňa (The Equestrienne).

Project duration: March to November 2013

The most important activities of the project:

- Proofreading and editing of the book was done in collaboration with DBD actress suffering of psychiatric diagnosis and who is long-term living on the street.
- Communication with woman illustrator Lucia Dovičáková, the illustrator of the book and author of the book cover.
- Distributing the book in selected bookstores across Slovakia.

The results of the project:

- Proofreading and editing of the works were also done by homeless woman suffering from psychiatric diagnose (approved by Slovak authorities as severe disability with abbreviation ZŤP) who is long-term living on the street. In addition, two women currently on maternity leave were offered realization as well. Women illustrator Lucia Dovičáková in high pregnancy stadium at that time is the author of the cover and illustration in the book and Anna Killiánová edited text while on a long-term maternity leave. By participation of women from disadvantaged population groups in the labour market we fulfilled the goal of "strengthening gender equality policy" and enabling access to culture for people with social exclusion.
- In September 2013 we have published the book Krasojazdkyňa (The Equestrienne) in Slovak language written by Uršuľa Kovalyk.
- On November 7, 2013 we organized author reading and book signing at the Artformum bookstore in Košice, where common presentation of the book, project and DBD took place to the general and professional public by writer Uršľa Kovalyk.
- We distributed the book Krasojazdkyňa (The Equestrienne) to the bookstores in Slovakia. The book is regularly distributed in all small bookstores as well as Internet shops. It is also available in Slovak libraries and in libraries of ZZŽ Aspekt, Nota bene and other non-governmental institutions.

The book obtained positive reviews in literary magazine Romboid 9/2013, in the daily news Aktuality (14. 10. 2013), magazine Glosália (9. 1. 2014) and Pravda daily newspaper (18. 12. 2013).

The presentation of the book in radio took place on October 30, 2013 on Rádio Regina station in Krajina kníh (Landscape of the Books) show. The passages from the book were read and subsided with a review of Ivana Taranenková, respected literary critic.

The internet portal Inforum. Artform.sk published an interview with Uršul'a Kovalyk.

Rádio FM station broadcasted another interview with Uršuľa Kovalyk in Slová FM with Jurajom Kušnierikom show (Words FM with Juraj Kušnierik) on September 11, 2013.

DIVADLO BEZ Tool against xenophobia, discrimination and intolerance

The main objective of the project: eliminating discrimination, xenophobia and intolerance by homeless people theatre.

Project duration: Jun to December 2013

The most important activities of the project:

- Performance of theatre play in Bratislava.
- Performance of theatre plays in various places in Slovakia.
- Short discussion between audience, actors/actresses DBD after the performance.

The results of the project:

- By playing theatrical performances in which the homeless, disabled and otherwise socially excluded people performed, we showed the audience that they can create something positive even though they are in a difficult social situation.
- Theatre play in which people of different ages, Roma and immigrants starred we showed the audience that they are full members of society and by their acceptance by the audience we actually avoid discrimination, racism, xenophobia and other forms of intolerance.
- A short discussion took place between the audience and the actors / actresses
 of DBD during which they talk about personal experiences (problems on the
 street) related to their life adversity. By discussion we have increased the audience
 awareness of homeless as well as disabled people and sensitized attitude towards
 them.
- All the actors and actresses had the same rules during the project and receive the same financial reward for performance, so we adhere to the principle of equal treatment for men and women.





Project in 2013 'DIVADLO BEZ DOMOVA

The results of the project:

- By playing theatrical performances in Bratislava and other Slovak cities for free we created cultural activities and have contributed to cultural and social events in smaller towns / villages.
- Payment of compensations for our theatre actors / actresses had improved the quality of life of disadvantaged groups.
- We had theatrical performances in Nitrica, Trenčín, Špania Dolina, Banská Štiavnica and in jail named Ústav na výkon trestu a odňatia slobody in Košice.
- In Bratislava we played seven theatrical productions in total.
- We increased self confidence of actors and actresses of DBD.
- We influenced ninety prisoners in positive and motivating way in 2nd Correctional group in Košice jail.
- We were the first theatre in history of the jail that came to play for their clients.
- We performed on the most prestigious summer festival Bažant Pohoda 2013.
- TA3 news television has filmed Bábka (The Puppet) performance that took place in Bratislava on December 11, 2013 and interviewed the cast of DBD. The coverage was aired on December 12, 2013 in the main news.



Project in 2013 GREY MATTERS

The main objective of the project:

- Build the partnership among organization from six different countries using participatory theatre in socio-educational context.
- Involvement of at least 60 adults who are educated (including older ones) from six countries by mean of participatory theatre.
- Learn attitude towards aging in six different countries and cultures across Europe, exploring the similarities, contrasts and comparisons.
- Provide an opportunity for older people to be creative.
- Learn theatrical techniques and also create and present the performances based on their own ideas and experiences.
- Evaluation of the impact and effectiveness of participatory theatre as the tool to improve the emotional well being and mental health, confidence, feeling bigger awards in the community, improving self-assessment and reducing the isolation.
- Enable older participants to work closely with younger people.
- Use the theatre as a mean to better understanding of the people from different cultures and generations.
- Exploring a wide range of methods and approaches, sharing of skills among members of the participating organizations that work with older people on participatory theatre base.
- Enhance practice within the partners on European level and spreading the results of partnership.

- Organizing an intergenerational theatre project with older people.
- Visit theatrical performance at a partner organization in Germany.
- Host theatres from Germany and Netherlands in Bratislava.
- Participation in the evaluation and spreading the education.

7th International Festival of homeless theatres

The main objective of the project: International Festival of homeless and disabled theatres ERROR is the only festival in Europe aimed at theatres which play the homeless people. It creates a space where theatre groups that work with marginalized groups present to the general public the original theatrical productions. The theatres make visible various social topics that are often not shown by professional theatres. It is a platform where "healthy" majority meets the people who are socially and culturally excluded. It helps break down stereotypes that exist against the homeless and assist their re-socialization.

In 2013 our invitation was accepted by community theatres from the Czech Republic, the Netherlands, Hungary, Poland, Slovenia and Slovakia that work with the homeless, physically and mentally handicapped persons, with drug addicts, pensioners, Roma, refugees.

The most important activities of the project:


- We have created a space for the presentation of the arts activities for theatre groups that work with marginalized populations.
- We have increased a visibility of the social issues that commercial arts often overlook.
- We have brought together different nationalities in the common artistic activity.
- We establish alternative arts events.
- We remove the stereotypes that exist against marginalized groups in society.
- We make visible various community theatres.
- We organized the festival with international participation.
- We organized a press conference.
